Some thoughts...

In September we were joined by Transitional Interim Conference Minister Don Remick. Don shared with us his thoughts on church today. Some of what we learned is that 80-95% of people claim a belief in something 'other', what some might call God. And 80-95% of people claim to pray to a divine 'something'. However, people's attendance at a Christian church on any given weekend, based on church attendance reports, averages less than 20% (with older generations being at least twice as likely to attend as younger generations.). Roughly, this means that nearly 2/3rds of the population believe in God, and have a spiritual practice but do not typically attend church. And that number is increasing with each new generation.

So what can we do? At Reverend Remick's workshop entitled "Weird Church" on Super Saturday (held in October), he offered some ideas. Remick states that there are three choices: stay the same, being as faithful as possible to God and our constituency knowing this will only last sustainably for maybe another quarter century, evolve to be able to continue ministering in the changing world, birth new forms of ministry and faith communities. So, staying the same will most likely only carry us through another 20-25 years. But, like Pastor Chris has said many times, change is HARD!

Remick also offers his insight as to what a vital church looks like. One detail is being flexible, resilient and patient. "Flexible: able to adapt to changes around them. Resilient: able to overcome discouragement and failures. Patient: able to stay in the in-between place while waiting for things to become clearer, not rushing to quick or technical fixes and formulas." He also says that it's "Not about attracting people in. The church understands that their goal is not about getting more people into the pews and pledges into the plate. Rather, it is moving out of the church in service to God to develop, provoke and nurture God's realm of love, compassion, and justice."

With church no longer being central to the culture and Sundays becoming less and less "sacred" for people, it's helpful to look at some of these ideas to understand how we can help GCC be the church in Groveland for longer than the next 25 years.

As I have shared with you, it has been has always been my tradition to give a story sermon series through the season of Advent and this would be the article where I share your first glimpse of what might be in story this Christmas season. These sermon series have always been a source of joy and celebration for me and the congregations I have served. It has been a time that reflects the season of Advent within a modern setting, and time when we experience childlike wonder and anticipation together.

Last year I did not experience this. This has left me in a dilemma. It has always been my goal that my stories were a reflection of the Gospel scriptures we were reading each week, that they would be modern parables. Perhaps I have failed and creating and drawing the connections between the scripture and my stories. Perhaps last year's story was vexing because the main character, a Mall Santa, also happened to be Transgender; I intended this to be an intriguing idea, I did not mean for it to be the point of the story nor critical to the plot line.

I think sermons are supposed to be events that stretch us, move us, and help us stumble into new ways of knowing God at times by asking unsettling questions. My ordination vows call on me to be a prophet speaking God's word even when others don't want to hear, yet always doing so from a place of love. I don't want my sermons to just be an intellectual exercise or just deep stirring of emotions but have elements of both.

When I look out to the congregation I see people who come with their own understanding of God, their own ears with which to hear, their own experiences of life, their own lens to see the world and so I know that different styles of sermons speak differently to different people, some folks love academic and thought invoking sermons, some love sermons that focus on values and morals, some love sermons that ask deep hard questions, and others love sermons that have pointed to political troubles of our times.

I can recall sharing sermons that I felt were downright terrible, and long before I reached the receiving line I had already vowed to never do one like that again, and yet despite my failing even these sermons would have someone stop to say that God spoke to them, or that they were moved or challenged. The only explanation for this in mind is that such events are about God's mystery rather than any talent on my part.

As we come into Advent, I ask you to come with an open heart, willing to listen with new ears, to listen with our children to a story that is layered with meaning and questions. Perhaps the narrative will ask you questions you don't like or disapprove of, perhaps not. Come meet Amanda and her journey toward what is most holy and sacred in our world. My prayer remains that more than anything else you hear God's story being interwoven into what it means to be human, a story of light and hope being born again into our lives.

Pastoral Search Team Update

The Search Team formally started the search process with a dinner meeting that took place on September 8th. This meeting was attended by the Search Team, the Profile writing team and our Associate Conference Minister, Rev. Wendy Vander Hart.

Our first goal was to complete the Church Profile that would be used to advertise the open position for a settled pastor. The profile was completed in October and approved by the UCC staff. The profile has been placed on the UCC website and we are currently receiving applications from interested candidates.

As we sift through applications we continue to refine the actual interview that we intend to use; this work is expected to be completed in November.

Our next step will be to conduct a mock interview that will be coordinated with Rev. Wendy Vander Hart to test our interview and deepen our understanding of the process. We expect to finish this work in November and begin scheduling interviews as time and schedules permit. We are currently meeting weekly in an effort to complete the process in a timely manner. We are making good progress against the timeline as provided by the UCC.

Updates will continue as soon as we have specific information to pass on to the congregation.

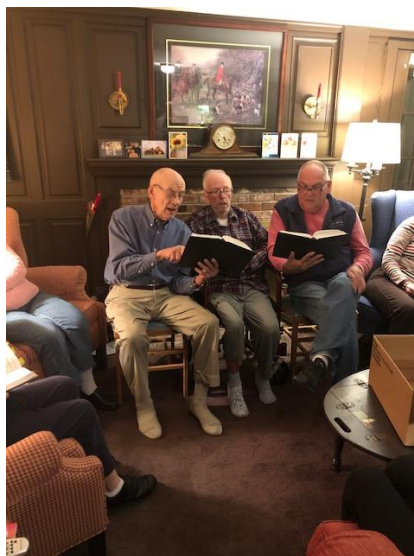

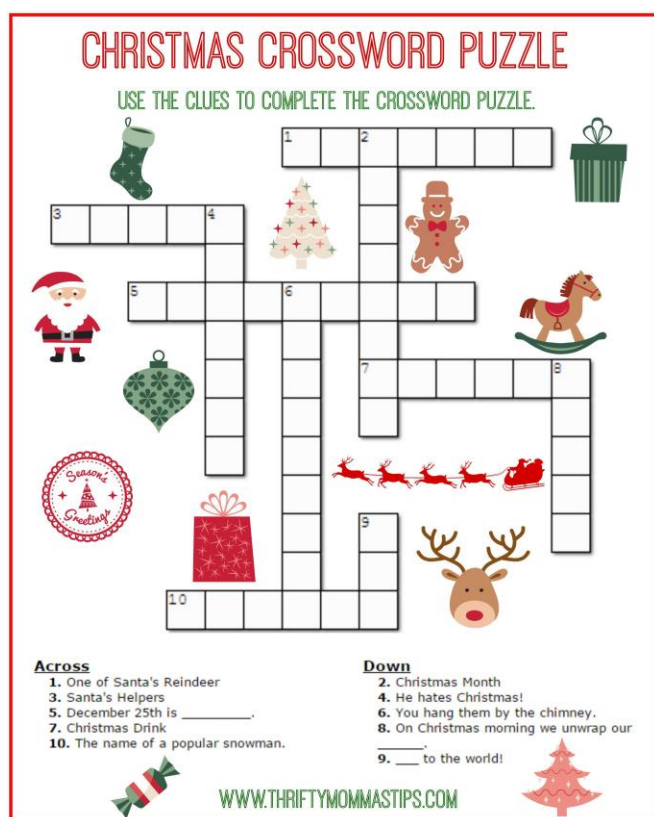
